News and Notes

We are saddened to learn about the death of Bob Armstrong at the age of 90. He was the eldest son of Minnie Armstrong (b. Rae)

who was one year old when she came to the Squamish Valley in 1889. Bob married Hazel Midnight and they had three daughters, Darlene, Roberta and Valerie. He worked for Merrill & Ring Logging, served overseas in WWII, and then worked for many years for the PGE/BC Railway.

He was known for his cheerful, outgoing personality and was an enthusiastic member of local choirs. Bob was involved in the Squamish Credit Union, the Branch 70 Seniors Association, the Legion and the Railway Heritage Park.

Bob was one of our local historians and he produced a slide show of our history and last presented this collection of old photographs in the mid 1990s at the Squamish Public Library. He gave his collection of slides to Lesley Keith, his niece, and member of the SHS executive, who used many of the images in her PowerPoint presentation given at the Brackendale Art Gallery, Hilltop House and the Manor.

Well known B.C. crime novelist William Deverell will be coming to Squamish to meet with the SHS and Squamish Nation elders to discuss his upcoming novel set in the area. Mr. Deverell's acclaimed first novel *Needles* won the Seal Award and drew on his experience as a lawyer. He has published numerous works of fiction and non-fiction



including *A Life on Trial*, *April Fool* and *Snow Job*.

The SHS is pleased to announce that we have recently received a Squamish community grant to help furnish our permanent facility at the Wilkie House

and to purchase the equipment and resources required to promote the history of the region. Our first membership meeting of the season is Thursday, September 10th at 7 pm at the Sea to Sky Hotel in the Garibaldi Estates as the Tantalus Senior Centre is now closed. Diane Mitchell from the BC Museum of Mining will be our guest speaker to talk to us about the next steps for our growing archival collection.

The clock on Cleveland Avenue, funded by the Rotary Club in the 1980s, has been donated to the Squamish Historical Society. It will be put on permanent display at our new location outside the Wilkie building at the West Coast Railway Heritage Park.
